

PLEASE SUPPORT **HB 6695** AAC THE PROTECTION OF YOUTH FROM CONVERSION THERAPY

- The conversion therapy ban bill would make it impermissible for licensed health professionals to engage in discredited and harmful practices that seek to change a minor's sexual orientation or gender identity, so-called conversion therapy. Any licensed health professional who does so would be subject to discipline by the Department of Public Health up to and including the loss of their professional license. The bill would permit someone who is subjected to this mistreatment to bring a consumer fraud claim to recover damages suffered as a result. The bill would prohibit any state funds from being used towards this harmful practice.
- The term conversion therapy refers to a range of dangerous and discredited practices that seek to change a person's sexual orientation or gender identity.
- The nation's leading medical, mental health, and human services professional organizations reject conversion therapy as a legitimate practice. This includes the American Medical Association, the American Psychiatric Association, the American Psychological Association, and the National Association of Social Workers, among many others. - Other states have passed similar legislation. Similar legislation protecting children from conversion therapy has passed in California, Illinois, New Jersey, Oregon, Vermont and Washington D.C. This session, legislation is proceeding in Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, Maine, New Hampshire, New Mexico and Colorado. Legal challenges to similar legislation have failed with federal appellate courts upholding the constitutionality of the challenged laws.
- Kids who are sent to conversion therapy may be sent by parents who reject them. Minors who experience family rejection because of their sexual orientation or gender identity face serious health risks. Research demonstrates that lesbian, gay, and bisexual young adults who reported higher levels of family rejection, including

admission to conversion therapy, were 8.4 times more likely to report having attempted suicide, 5.9 times more likely to report high levels of depression, 3.4 times more likely to use illegal drugs, and 3.4 times more likely to report having engaged in unprotected sex when compared to non-gay peers who reported no or low levels of family rejection. Even when loving parents may think they are doing the right thing with conversion therapy, their child is still harmed by the practice.

Both the nation's and our state's leading medical, mental health, and human services professional organizations do not recognize conversion therapy as a legitimate therapy and have condemned the practice; they include:
